# Length of contribution

Articles: Usually 2000 to 5000 words (including footnotes)

Recent developments: Book reviews, conferences, short news etc.: Usually 300 to 1500 words

#### Articles have to be structured as follows:

- comprise an abstract (max. 150 words)
- give a short introduction into the issue
- be divided into chapters
- draw conclusions
- include references / bibliography at the end

## Language

Contributions *must* be submitted in English language.

## Copyright

Please indicate in a footnote if the article has already been accepted by / printed in another journal.

#### **Edition contributions**

The Editors deserve the right to alter the text of a contribution in order to make it conform with the *elni Review* layout. If an article is too long, the author will be requested to shorten accordingly. If editing is necessary, the author will be asked for approval and to confirm the revised version.

#### Citation

- literal quotations in inverted commas
- short references as footnote
- full references in the bibliography at the end
- Short and full references must always end with a full stop.

#### Short references

- last name of the author, year, page (p. / pp.):
  - o Brugge, 2021, p. 4.
  - o Brugge and Coals, 2021, p. 4.
  - o Brugge et al., 2021, pp. 4-12. (if more than two authors)
- Judgement: Court, year, X v Y, number of the case. ECLI.
  - o CJEU, 1989, Fratelli Costanzo SpA v Comune di Milano, Case 103/88, ECLI:EU:C:1989:256, para 27.
- Websites or links: author/company/name of the website, year.
  - o ECHA, 2020.

Always indicate a short reference, don't use supra note or similar.
